Day 1: Arrive in and Explore Ushuaia

After a warm welcome at the airport, we'll transfer you to one of our partnered premium hotel resorts nestled in breathtaking Patagonian surroundings. Take time to unwind or head out to explore Ushuaia, the southernmost city in the world. Our evening briefing is your opportunity to ask questions and meet some of your fellow explorers.

Day 2, All Aboard!

After a warm welcome at the airport, we'll transfer you to one of our partnered premium hotel resorts nestled in breathtaking Patagonian surroundings. Take



time to unwind or head out to explore Ushuaia, the southernmost city in the world. Our evening briefing is your opportunity to ask questions and meet some of your fellow explorers.

Day 3, Southern Ocean

As we sail south, important briefings on environmental regulations and expedition safety will be held. You won't want to miss our scientific and environmental experts as they begin their deeply knowledgeable – and always entertaining – talks about the wildlife, history, and geology of the regions we'll soon be exploring.

Day 4: West Falklands/Malvinas

Today we explore some of the westernmost settled outposts in the Falklands/Malvinas, a remote South Atlantic archipelago renowned for its rugged terrain and dramatic, cliff-lined coast. As we stretch our legs along farmland and beaches, we'll visit albatross and penguin colonies. Look for Rockhopper, King, and Magellanic penguin rookeries.

Day 5: Stanley, East Falklands/Malvinas

Stanley, the archipelago's largest town, is a lively hub nestled in a sheltered harbor. The Falkland Islands Museum features fascinating exhibits devoted to maritime exploration, natural history, and the 1982 Falklands War. We'll likely visit Gypsy Cove, part of the Cape Pembroke Peninsula National Nature Reserve. Magellanic penguins – also known as "Jackass" penguins for their braying call – nest here in underground burrows. Other native bird species include Black-crowned Night Herons, Long-tailed Meadowlarks, Two-banded Plovers, and Upland and Kelp Geese. Nearby Ordnance Point is the final resting place of several World War II guns.

Days 6–7: Southern Ocean

Things ramp up as we head east across the Antarctic Convergence and officially enter Antarctic waters.

Birdlife becomes more abundant – see if you can spot the world’s largest flying bird, the Wandering Albatross. From soaring Southern Giant Petrels to tiny Wilson’s Storm Petrels, an impressive range of species rides the updrafts created by ocean swells. Keep watch for whale blows and your first iceberg sighting.

Days 8–11: South Georgia

Often called the “Serengeti of the Southern Ocean,” South Georgia lives up to its name with tens of thousands (not a typo!) of breeding penguins, seals, and seabirds. Breathtaking mountain scenery, sculpted icebergs, glaciers in every direction, and a rich historical legacy complement the incredible wildlife. We’ll travel along South Georgia’s leeward coast and visit the historic Grytviken whaling station, home to the small cemetery where Sir Ernest Shackleton is buried.

Days 12–14: Scotia Sea

Heading farther south, we continue our informative presentations and wildlife spotting as icebergs grow larger and more plentiful..

Days 15–18: Antarctic Peninsula and South Shetland Islands

Here we’ll explore a variety of picturesque bays and famed landing sites, maneuvering through iceberg-rich channels alongside abundant wildlife. Opportunities may include visits to active scientific bases and historic landing sites. Expect a wide range of penguin species, as well as seals and whales along the rugged coastlines and in open waters..

Days 19–20: Drake Passage

We leave this magical place and make our way north, once again crossing the legendary Drake Passage. One final celebration awaits, including a special slideshow, passenger photo contest, and a farewell dinner together. Congratulations, explorers!

Day 21: Ushuaia Disembarkation

With huge smiles on weary but content faces, we disembark in the morning. From here, you may catch a flight to Buenos Aires or remain in Ushuaia to continue exploring at your leisure.
